
Pom & Olive is located at 1400 Bristol Street, Building C in Costa Mesa. (See map below)

This Month's Speaker

Flyfishing Adventures in the Sea of Cortez

With
Gary Bulla



In February we welcome back Gary Bulla, with an updated program on the exciting fishing to be found in Southern Baja. Gary is a familiar figure on the local saltwater scene and brings an infectious enthusiasm to his presentations. Pack your bags for Mexico!

Gary Bulla's presentation will take anglers through the fishing season on the Sea of Cortez in Southern Baja. Gary will share his discoveries with the club, including tackle and techniques for the dazzling variety of fish south of the border.

At five million years old this inland sea is the youngest in the world; yet biologically it is the richest body of water on our planet. The diversity of fish in Baja waters means anglers can revisit Baja at various times of the year and have very different quarry. There is surface sight fishing and deeper water fishing at all times of the year. Panga fishing from outboard skiffs modified for flyfishing can produce rod bending, spool burning takes that test your endurance and your knot tying.

Casting to rooster fish or dorado on the surface is a sport sure to provide a large dose of adrenalin.

There is no other fishing that is comparable to flyfishing for roosters. It is sight fishing taken to the extreme. Because of the incredible surface action that causes sheer panic and adrenalin spikes and their completely unpredictable movements and moods, it is considered by many to be the most dynamic flyfishing on the planet.

What makes this part of Baja's Sea of Cortez so special? The Punta Arenas/Cerralvo Island area is unique. All world records for Roosterfish are recorded here. The bait populations here are abundant and support a huge population of both pelagic and reef dwellers. Coral reefs flourish adjacent to incredibly deep trenches, combined with the seasonal winds enhanced by the channel, they create the

constant upwellings of plankton and other nutrients that provide the foundation for an astounding diversity of species.

Not only do over 900 species of fish thrive here, but sea turtles, sea lions, whales, orcas, huge schools of manta rays and dolphins are residents during many months of the year. Jacques Cousteau spent so much time exploring the richness of the area that the Mexican Government officially changed the name of Cerralvo Island to Jacques Cousteau Island. He called it "The world's aquarium".

For fly fishers, the large bays, points, and the island mean that there is usually shelter from open sea winds and swells when present. Pangas, or small open boats, can be utilized effectively. They are stealthier and more maneuverable than large sport fishing boats. Two anglers can fish at once and cast in most any direction when necessary. Roosterfish cruise the inshore within a few hundred feet of the beach for food as small as the flat iron herring, or "sardina", and as large as ladyfish. Yellowfin tuna and dorado can be caught close to shore also. You don't have to run miles to offshore banks to find them.

Are you interested in a fly-fishing trip – someplace you've gone before or maybe someplace you've always wanted to go?








There is no charge for the class (a nominal TBD material fee may apply); You do need to be a member of FFCOC. The class is limited to ten participants.

Rod Building Class First Session is March 25

Learn how to build your own fly rod. We will start with a rod blank and a pile of components. When you are finished you will have built a 3 wt rod, that cost about \$140 (pricing details will follow). It will take three Saturdays, plus 10 -15 hours of home work to complete your rod.

Everyone will make the same 3wt rod so that we can help each other and mistakes will be less likely. After the class, you will know how to source and buy components, select rod blanks, and make handles, all the skills necessary to make any type of rod you want.

Club News (Outing Report - Fishing In Town)

FIT Outing - East Fork San Gabriel River

Sunday Jan. 22, 2023

Seven intrepid anglers tried to fish the East Fork too soon after the big rains! We met at the Bridge To Nowhere trailhead. We had to fight for parking spaces with the large number of bungee jumpers setting up to use the Bridge To Nowhere. Since we both had to use the same trail, but they went further up, they left before we did.

The river was a beautiful glassier color due to the heavy snow melt and storm run-off. Visibility was about 4 feet, so still fishable, if we could find the right pools. We could see immediately that the flows were higher than normal. There were large logs and debris lodged high in tree crotches 8 -10' above the river bed. It was obvious this canyon had been scoured in the recent storms.

The one mile hike to fishing water was enhanced by two exciting river crossings. These crossings would normally be a quick wade across in shin deep water. On Sunday, the water was at our waists and absolutely ripping along. We buddy waded for the most part, and occasionally used ropes to cross the river. Those who tried to wade without a buddy struggled, and one angler took a nice cold swim in the 50F water!

The fish must have been as irritated by the conditions as we were. No one found a fish all day! In this normally easy fishing river, we didn't see any sign of a fish of any size. We tried nymphs, streamers, and dries with no results. We tested slack water eddies, and pools. We tested the bottom and behind big rocks. We don't know where the fish were holding.

A few hours of futile testing of the water, we ate lunch and hiked back to the cars. It was a beautiful day and a nice walk, so no one seemed to mind the lack of fish. We were all reminded this is why our sport is called fishing instead of catching!



2023 Outings - Lower Owens (Mentor Outing)

Mentor Outings Lower Owens River, Bishop CA

Dates:

- February 18 & 19, 2023
- March 18 & 19, 2023

These outings are intended for Club members who do not have a lot of experience fly fishing (novices) and experienced members willing to spend Saturday morning acting as mentors providing direction and encouragement to the novices. Signups will be limited to about 10 novices depending on the number of Club members that volunteer as mentors. You can sign up for the outing online by clicking the associated Event on the Club Calendar on the FFCOC website. Both novices and mentors need to register and you need to sign up for each session separately if you plan on attending both. Doug Jones is the stream keeper for this outing and you can contact him at 714-697-2222 or dougjones.oc@gmail.com if you have questions.

Outing Preparation:

- Inventory your equipment and supplies well in advance of the outing so you arrive in Bishop prepared. If you attended On the River Training program the handouts list many of the items you should consider bringing. Make sure to get a 2023 fishing license.
- A pre-outing meeting is tentatively scheduled for February 7th at 7:00PM via Zoom to review fishing gear, flies, personal gear, travel, lodging, meals, etc.
- Mentors should be familiar with Guidance For Working With Novices. Mentors will be provided a copy if they don't have one.
- Mentors should consider fishing on their own Friday prior to the outing to get a handle on current conditions and scout places to fish.
- You should be in good physical condition to participate. Weather may be cold and wet. You should be prepared to walk at least a half mile on uneven and slippery surfaces to fishing locations. Some wading is necessary reach most of the good fishing locations and you may need to climb up or down slopes to enter the river.

2023 Outings - Lower Owens (Mentor Outing) - Con't

Outing:

- Friday – Travel to Bishop
- Meet up Saturday February 18th / Saturday March 18th at 8:30AM at the Pleasant Valley Campground on Chalk Bluff Road at the walking bridge.
- You should reach out to others to coordinate carpooling to Bishop.
- Saturday – Mentors spend the morning fishing with novices. This is a fishing buddy relationship, the mentors are not guides or in any way responsible for novices' equipment, supplies, wellbeing, etc. Saturday afternoon everyone is on their own for an afternoon of fishing. Novices are encouraged to pair up so they have a fishing buddy for the afternoon.
- Saturday evening – Informal dinner get-together - location to be announced later.
- Sunday – Meet at the footbridge at 8:30AM, answer questions novices may have and everyone is on their own for a day of fishing. Novices may wish to pair up so they have a fishing buddy for the day.

Where We Are Going:

Loa Utah Home of the **Quiet Fly Fisher** and is located in a beautiful valley at 7064" elevation, which hosts a few small towns like Loa, Lyman, Bicknell and Torrey. This is farming and livestock country and is surrounded by mountain ranges of which we will be fishing. There are National Parks near by that offer spectacular scenery, Bryce Canyon to the South West and Capitol Reef to the East, Fish Lake National Forest to the North West along with Boulder Mountain with an elevation of 11,317 which provides many fishing locations, and spectacular views.

Guide Contact Information:

Our head guide in **Loa, Utah** is **Mike James** owner of the **Quiet Fly Fisher** their address is 200 N. Main Street Loa, Utah 84747 Contact Phone Number is 435-616-2319.

Weather & Clothing:

We will be lodging at approx. 7,000' elevation. Nights are cold and days are warm usually, I have experienced rain, snow, hail, and hot and cold days. Bring clothing you can put on in layers that wick moisture, nothing more uncomfortable than moisture under your clothing, which either keeps you hot and sweaty or cold and sweaty. Bring a lightweight rain jacket. Most days you will be wearing your waders but on hot day I wet wade with light shirt nylon pants and my wading boots on, don't forget the neoprene booties if wet wading. Be flexible, bring both cold and warm weather gear and adjust as needed. Weather at high altitude can change rapidly be prepared. The weather will not stop your guide from fishing unless it is dangerous and or access is limited. They will advise if there is a problem. Mother nature sets the parameters we must always be aware of our surroundings and climate.

Lodging:

There are many options in the region of Loa, Utah both in town and adjoining hamlets like Lyman and Bicknell. I would suggest The Mill Cabins 1500 S. HWY 24 Lyman, Utah (435) 491-0426 as a wonderful place with individual cabins that can sleep two and are very reasonably priced, **Bruce & Dana Chappell** are the owners. In Loa the Snuggle Inn is pricy but luxurious by small town standards. In Bicknell the SunGlow Motel and Restaurant is comfortable and reasonably priced. Lodging in these areas can be limited so make your lodging reservation early; I do not take responsibility for making anyone's lodging reservations due to last minute cancelations and family emergencies. I recommend you book you're lodging early, as lodging will be harder to find closer to the trip dates. Many travelers hit the road after school is in session and before winter.

Physical Demands:

Where we are lodging at 6500' to 7,000' elevation we can be fishing and hiking at as high as 11,000'. If you have problems at altitude let the guide and streamkeeper know in advance of our trip. Most fishing locations involve some hiking and wading. I would suggest arriving a couple of days early to acclimate to 7,000' not hiking hard and drinking plenty of water, it easy to dehydrate in higher elevations, the guide has water and soft drinks along in their vehicles so ask for the water.

Gear:

Rods & Lines. The entire trip can be done with a 9-foot 5-weight rod and a floating line and a sinking line, one rod is all you need.

Waders. Good pair of breathable waders is required in most situations.

Boots. Wading boots are part of the package. No restrictions on felt as yet.

Wading Staff. Many of us find having a wading staff necessary for stability in slippery or rocky situations, or just find a long stick, don't fall, the rocks are unforgiving.

Terminal Tackle. I use a 9 foot 5x leader and have along 2,3,4,5,6x tippet. I as well bring an assortment of lead free shot to use as needed if nymphing.

Flies. We will be fishing many lakes and a few streams and possibly a couple of rivers. I carry dries, nymphs and streamers but the guide will provide you with flies. If the guide suggests a fly or gives you a fly use it with the full understanding you will catch fish, they are quite experienced on these waters. If you are like me I bring many more flies than I will ever use. I have hoppers, caddis, mayflies, and damselflies in adult and nymph stages. I find a callibaetis mayfly nymph very useful in the lakes. Bring what you own and the fly shop offers all the working patterns you will be using if you want to purchase some.

First Aid Kit: I carry a basic first aid kit in my tote bag for simple emergencies, minor cuts and abrasions.

Transportation:

From L.A. Southern California is a 9 1/2-hour drive including gas stops and a lunch stop to Loa, Utah. Sharing a ride is more fun to get to know you friend or partner better and listen to each other experiences along the way. When in Loa the guides provide the transportation to and from the days fishing locations. Salt Lake City is approximately 3 hours away from Loa and is serviced by many airlines and rental car companies.

Float Tubing:

There will be opportunities to float tube in the area if you so desire. **The Quiet Fly Fisher** in Loa can provide you with a float tube if they are guiding you. If you wish the comfort of your own float tube please feel free to bring yours.

Food:

In Utah many of their dinning locations close on Sunday, it is best to call ahead or ask you guide where and what is open, most areas have a couple options on Sunday but it is best to inquire. Guides provide lunch during the days guiding. Many of us BBQ at the Mill Cabins for dinner, to curb the costs of eating out every meal, the grocery in the town of Loa is open Mon.- Sat. Breakfast is your choice of eating at a local restaurant or at your lodging, the guide provides lunch the days you are fishing.

Libations:

You are responsible for any liquor you wish to purchase either bought from the local Liquor store in Bicknell or for beer (3.2) in some of the gas stations, or bring from home. BYOB.

Costs and Payment:

The guide requires a [Non-refundable](#) \$200 deposit to secure your reservation and the final payment is due upon completion of your final day.

Tipping:

It is customary to tip the guide daily; I tip \$50 per day of guiding at the end of the day. Tipping is not based on your ability or the number of fish caught, but for good service and the ability of the guide to lead you doing everything in their ability to make the experience enjoyable. Fish are a bonus. I have negotiated quite reasonable rates for the group of six and feel a percentage tip is quite unfair to the guide considering the extreme road conditions, locations and wear and tear on their vehicles. These extreme road conditions keep most of your competition for fish away.

Fishing License:

Utah state fishing license can be obtained on line prior to your trip, which is the easiest. Licenses can be purchased in Loa at the local store Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. Yearly licenses last from the date you purchase them for a complete calendar year.

Emergency Services:

Bicknell near Lyman has a clinic available for minor emergencies.

A deposit of \$200 Non Refundable is sent to John Williams to hold your spot and sent then forwarded to the guide. The total cost of the trip is \$1,250 for five days of guiding. The staff of The Quiet Fly Fisher of Loa Utah will guide us.

The Spirit of Dame Berners - New Waters

By Larry Behm



This is the second in a series of articles that discuss learning how to be a better fly angler.

How do you go about preparing to fish new water? I have asked Doug: Jones to answer a few questions about approaching a trip to “new water”. Doug is an excellent angler and caster, a long-time member of the club, a past president, and currently the coordinator of our learning program “On The Water Training”.

We use the term “new water” here to mean water where you don’t have first-hand knowledge of the situation. This could be a new river or lake, returning to a river at a different time of year, or an area that has undergone restoration.

Why would you plan before you go to new water?

Doug: Because I would want to make sure I enjoy what I'm doing and that I have a successful trip. We all measure success a bit differently. But, if I spend the time and the effort and money is involved to go somewhere, I don't want to come back frustrated and disappointed. I want to come home planning my next trip to go back again.

How would you go about planning a trip to new water?

Doug: Well, the first thing I would consider going to new water is to see if any of my fishing buddies have been there and would like to go along with me. It is always advantageous to learn from other people's experience. Look for some guidance and some practical knowledge from somebody that's been there. If it happens that you don't know anybody who has been there, you can reach out through the club forums on our web page. You can ask questions at meetings or even stand up at one of our meetings and say “I'm thinking about going to this place, is anybody interested in coming along?” There's a lot of advantages to taking somebody along with you. There's just the plain camaraderie and enjoying each other's time as well as learning from each other. There are also some safety concerns if you're out hiking or fishing and you don't want to be out there alone. Also, it's a little cheaper to go with somebody else who can share the cost of gas and lodging and some of the other items.

If you find someone to go with you, what should you still do for planning?

Doug: Even if you're going to go with somebody who says they know the water, I suggest you not get too lazy and that you do some research for yourself. Your buddy may be working on three or four-year old information or something their grandfather taught them or they haven't been there the

same time of year. So, it still makes sense to do your own research to supplement what you might learn from your fishing buddy and so you won't come across as just totally taking advantage of your buddy.

Is a guide useful?

Doug: Yes, they can be very helpful. Even if you're spending multiple days on that water, you may only have to hire a guide for a day or even half a day. A guide can make sure you're rigged up right and that you have the right gear and flies for the conditions on that particular day. I've done this before, for instance, the first time I fished the Pit River my friend and I hired a guide for half a day and then we fished for 2 1/2 days without the guide. The guide helped get us get started and to understand some oddities about the river. Such as, when the power stations release water, and how fast to expect the water to rise and make sure you're not on the wrong side of the river when it happens. So, hiring a guide can be an excellent way not just to learn the conditions, and how to approach the place, but also to learn peculiar aspects of fishing there. The techniques you used in your last trip may not be the techniques they're recommending when you show up.

What are some specific things you should research?

Doug: I'm basing my answer on the assumption that we picked a time, not some vague ideas of "let's go this summer." I would look at some fishing reports: go online and look at local fishing reports. They can help you with understanding water levels, provide charts of what insect hatches to expect, and general conditions you might encounter. This is going to help you with your expectations and preparation for the trip. For instance, you may be heading out with the thought that you're going to be throwing dry flies and the hatch charts indicate that only nymphing or streamers are working.

You should try to learn what time of day you might want to fish. When is the hatch expected, early, late early in the day, or in the afternoon? You need to think about the weather and is this a place you need waders or are you going to wet wade? What type of boots bottoms are needed, felt or rubber? (Felt is illegal in some places.)

Another thing I try to learn before I head out is kind of what kind of access points are there along the waterway? Can I take my little sedan and have enough ground clearance to get where I want to go, or am I going to need a vehicle with more ground clearance and maybe even four-wheel drive? And not just automobile access, but personal access. You know how difficult is the approach? How much hiking will be involved, what kind of terrain? Am I up to the physical task of getting where I want to get to go fishing? So, it wouldn't hurt even to call the local fly shop, and ask some of these questions.

What equipment should I bring, which line, tippets and leaders do I need? Most of us, if we're going trout fishing, lean towards our 4 or 5 weight rod and reel. That's probably good most of the time, but you need to make sure you ask questions and take the right gear. For example, if you have to use 6X,

tippet and you have a 6-weight rod, chances of breaking your tippet are quite high. With light tippets you might be better off with a lighter rod such as a three or four weight. I find that I have more success with gear that might be on the light side because I am less likely to break fish off and feel the strikes better.

What would you NOT do?

Doug: I would not get over committed to going until I've done some research and made sure it's what I want to do. Because once I commit to go, my ego says "I'm going". And then, I find out that the hiking's too rough, or it's the wrong time of year, or the water levels are too high. It's hard to back out, so I would do my investigation before I commit to make sure things fit my expectations and my abilities.

Another problem is not hearing people's advice that is not consistent with my preconception. I should probably listen to their advice, especially if it comes from more than one person. Because if I go with my preconceived notions, I may be the only guy in the river not catching fish.

Where can I find other resources?

Doug: There are quite a few books about different areas that you might consider everything ranging from 50 Places to Fly Fish Before You Die, to books on California Fishing, or 25 Hikes in the Eastern Sierras. In fact, the Club has an excellent book called Fly Fishing the Eastern Sierras. You may want to take a look at it before you go.

With all the mapping programs we have on our electronic devices you can look at maps and aerial photographs to zero in a lot of information about the access points and contours. Even if the map doesn't show contours, you can get a lot of information from the aerial photographs

Recent online fishing reports help to understand food and fish activity. The USGS stream gage reports help understand flow rates and water temperature.

I'll remind you of my first recommendation, check with club members using our forums program or at meetings. There are a lot of people with a lot of experience who are willing to share.



Flies That Keep On Giving!

Best Dressed Caddis

The Caddis Fly is found world wide. This is one of my versions that has proved it self.



Material:

| | |
|-----------|----------------------------------|
| Hook: | Size 10-14 curved nymph hook |
| Thread: | Black 8/0 |
| Eyes: | Small bead chain cut into a pair |
| Rib: | Orange small wire |
| Dubbing: | Ice dubbing |
| Thorax: | Peacock hurl |
| Legs: | Pheasant body feather fibers |
| Antennae: | Pheasant tail fibers |
| Cement: | Super Glue Gel Formula |

Instructions:

1. Cut a pair of eyes from a bead chain strand.
2. Place your hook in the vice upside down or if you have a rotary vice rotate it 180 degrees so the hook is up side down.
3. Place a slight smear of super glue just behind the eye then place the eyes on the hook and secure with several wraps of thread.
4. Turn your hook so it is right side up.
5. Tie in the rib behind the eyes and wrap your thread over to the bend as pictured.
6. Dub light green to orange to red ice dubbing from the bend to the thorax region.
7. Wrap the wire rib over the dubbing and tie off in the thorax area.
8. Tie in some pheasant body fibers on either side of the hook to form the legs.
9. Select two pheasant tail fibers keeping them the same length and tie in at the thorax, make the tips extend one and one quarter the length of the body.
10. Dub to the eyes with peacock hurl.
11. Smear your thread with superglue slightly and whip finish. Use super glue sparingly it can do great things when not over used.
